

Hi Assembly, I hope you're all doing well and keeping bundled up! It's getting chilly outside...

Here is a broad overview of what I have been working on lately:

JDUC Revitalization Project and AMS Office Flood | Over the past few weeks, I have been engaged in conversations with Queen's University to discuss the eminent move of the AMS Offices from the JDUC to both the LaSalle and Rideau buildings. There have been some challenges in locking in specific dates, but the AMS Executive is hoping to begin the move shortly after the return to in-person classes in January. Moving to our temporary space while the new JDUC is constructed presents some challenges:

- Creating a moving schedule to keep things organized.
- Identify what needs to move and what doesn't. Need to also identify garbage that can be recycled!

• Making some minor renovations to the LaSalle building to ensure the comfort and positive working environment that we offer at the AMS.

• Logistics of the move.

Furthermore, on October 16th, 2021, the John Deutsch University Centre (JDUC), and more specifically the Alma Mater Society (AMS) offices, flooded due to higher than average rainfall. Various experts, such as First On-Site and Pinchin Environmental classified the flood as class 3, meaning office carpets needed to be removed from all spaces due to possible contamination. Unfortunately, this is not the first time that the JDUC and subsequently the AMS offices, have flooded. In August of 2018, another higher-than-average rainfall event caused flooding. In response, I have sent some University officials a brief that outlines the need for proper stormwater management so that flooding is no longer a worry in the new JDUC. I will continue to be engaged in this project and will provide more information as I receive it.

AMS Student Fee Marketing Campaign | Recently, the AMS ran its Fall Referendum vote successfully. Big shoutout to Laura Devenny (Secretariat) and the Elections Team for ensuring it was a smooth process for clubs and the AMS alike. Unfortunately, the AMS failed in increasing its student fee but will try again in the Winter Referendum.

AMS Interns | Recently the AMS hired interns! I am so excited to welcome Santiago to the President portfolio and am excited to work with him on professional development and having fun 😳. Thanks to our HR team for setting up the hiring!

Agnes Benedickon Tricolour Award Considering the Rector position is currently vacant, I have agreed to Co-Chair the Agnes Benedickson Tricolour Award (ABTA) Committee alongside the AMS Director of Marketing, Peter. The Committee is responsible for selecting the recipients of the ABTA, the highest honor that can be given to a Queen's student. I will be working with Peter in the coming weeks to



form the committee and ensure that the process of selection is as fair as possible! I am super pumped to see all the incredible applicants we receive and heard the amazing things our students have accomplished over their time at Queen's University.

Exam Season | As we slowly creep toward exam season, I wish to remind Assembly to take care of themselves, treat themselves well, and prioritize their studying. I know all of you are incredibly busy with your roles, but it always serves us well to be reminded of why we are all here to begin with: study, learn, and be students! Below are some updates from the Services:

Common Ground | During October's sustainability month, Common Ground initiated the Eco Container Program. This program was launched through Queen's Hospitality Services and is similar to the Huskee Swap Program in that students can obtain an Eco Container through a deposit and use it at participating locations by bringing their used Eco Container and getting their food to go in a cleaned and sanitized Eco Container. In support of AMS Charity Month, customers can donate to the Kingston Youth Shelter while ordering at cash.

Printing & Copy Center | During sustainability month, the P&CC launched the use of Eco Paper, a more sustainable material compared to typical printer paper. I hope you have all been thriving through midterm season and are hanging in there through the final push of the semester.

Here is what has been keeping me busy:

OUSA General Assembly

The AMS sent a delegation to OUSA's general assembly where we discussed policies designed to further student interests. The papers that were being discussed included System Vision and accountability, Responding to Covid-19, Student mobility and transfer credit, and indigenous students. Our very own Commissioner of External Affairs and Government Affairs Manager helped author the System Vision and Accountability paper and did a phenomenal job.

OUSA Lobby Conference

This past week has been OUSA's lobby conference. This was a great experience to advocate directly to various MPP's and the provincial government and to discuss student needs. Our priorities for this year have centered around affordability, racial equity, sector sustainability, students with disabilities, and sexual violence prevention and response. A few key recommendations have included changes to osap funding, increasing operating grants for universities to decrease the reliance on international student tuition, and increased funding for community-based and culturally-relevant mental health resources among others.

Gender and Sexual Diversity Assistant Manager Hiring

We are extending the application for this new and exciting position until this Sunday (November 21st). If you know of anyone who is interested, please send along any relevant information. As a reminder, this position will be spearheading the new initiative we are implementing through the Social Issues Commission and Peer Support center for Queer and Trans students.

Dear Members of the AMS Assembly,

I hope you have all are well!

As we approach the end of the semester, ResSoc has been working on wrapping up our fall programming and preparing for the rollout of our winter initiatives. Major updates are provided below:

Programming/Initiatives

Fall Term

Many of our Residence Facilitators are in the process of planning and executing programming directed towards supporting first-year students through their first exam season, as well as enhancing the residence experience with holiday/winter break celebrations. Some of these programming initiatives include exam de-stress events, goodie bag pick-ups, tote bag painting, and door decorating contests. Furthermore, the front desk rental program for students is planned to begin soon as well, allowing students to rent out games and resources from their designated front desk. We will also be rolling out our period project pilot program in collaboration with Queen's Period in Adelaide-Ban Righ within the coming weeks.

Winter Term

The executive team and our first-year interns are currently planning initiatives to help curb the increase in malicious fire alarm incidents within residence this year. We are looking to address the surge in false fire alarms through passive and active programming methods and initiatives such as presentations, posters, and potentially an interactive video/module for the class of 2026.

Bursaries and Grants

Another aspect of our organizational goals for this year was to provide financial aid through bursaries and grants to better support students with their transition to university. One bursary that we are excited to make available for January is the Bus Pass Reimbursement Program for the students on West Campus. Student feedback indicated that students from Jean Royce Hall (JRH) have had trouble commuting to and from west campus without a bus pass; however, many did not purchase a bus pass in the fall due to the cost and their ability to walk when the weather was nice. Since the weather in the winter term will likely cause more distress when commuting, we have decided that we will be reimbursing approved first-year applicants (only from JRH) \$60 upon proof of purchase of a winter term bus pass. We have allocated about \$30,000 of our budget to ensure that we account for every potential student on west campus that may apply for this bursary.

Our community engagement initiatives have continued. Our cohort of ASUS City Engagement Program interns have met with their city members and projects are officially underway. This past month, we also hosted a Community Outreach Week which showcased all nine of ASUS' Community Outreach Committees.

Creative Works

Our sustainability team has been working hard on continuing to amplify messaging and raise awareness on our practices. This past month they have launched an Essay Writing Competition to allow for students to write pieces as part of a contest and engage with important and innovative topics. Additionally, all five journals have officially opened publications. We encourage any and all submissions to be sent their way!

Reflection Room

This past month, we have officially finalized the Reflection Room. We collaborated with Orientation and Council in clearing out the space. The room is now open for usage as we



continue adding artwork and educational elements to repurpose it to ensure it fulfills its mandate as a space for reflection.

Professional Development

Professional Development has been hard at work this past month. They have officially run their resume building workshop and a networking workshop. They have also paired up their first round of mentors and mentees for their Alumni Mentorship Program. Their big event was Life After ArtSci. It ran on November 13th from 10-2pm and was themed "Adapting with ArtSci". Students had the opportunity to hear from a variety of alumni who have ventured into entrepreneurship, science, politics and more. They also were able to connect with them through ongoing networking

Wellness and Research

Wellness ran their Burnout Workshop this past month. This will be a great opportunity for inperson strategies and conversations. The Director of Student Affairs Research has been working to release their first round of surveys this week. The two surveys focus on the perception of Queen's from a student and city perspective as well as an opportunity to see how supported International students feel in the community. This research will be comprised into a variety of reports to further shape our advocacy work. Finally, Equity Director has been working continuously to go through all of the ASUS policy manuals and documents in order to make equity based amendments. This will be able to support the long-term changes at ASUS.

SVPR

In continuation of our consultations last month, we have continued working on Sexual Violence Prevention and Response this month by meeting with more stakeholders such as the Dandelion Initiative. This month, we are doing a transparency campaign surrounding the resources that exist on campus. From the 15th-20th, we will be highlighting and breaking down the structures of different supports include the Sexual Assault Centre Kingston, the SVPR Office and the Haven App. We are hoping this will help make these resources more transparent and accessible to students.

ASUS 131st Birthday

Last year ASUS had the opportunity of celebrating its 130th birthday! As ASUS turns 131, we are hoping to do a variety of programming to highlight this. I have had the pleasure of working alongside Officer Katie Hunt and the rest of the marketing team this past month on putting together some incredible programming. Some central elements include a Then versus Now campaign, videos with testimonials from past presidents and fun disposables to humanize ASUS. We will also be launching the Faces of ASUS campaign to provide the opportunity to highlight our incredible volunteers and their stories. This will culminate in a walking open house of the ASUS office. We will be opening the house to allow the community to come and walk



around the office and explore. We will also be plugging our merchandise and include a photobooth.

In addition to the marketing campaign, we will also be launching resources such as the OnQ page this month in order to give back to students. This will be launching on the 29th to align with the celebrations. Additionally, we will be soliciting feedback from students as we look to change our mandate.
