# Student Life Centre

# Secretariat

Main goals of collaboration in this office for the coming year are to review the constitution and bring more awareness to AMS Assembly.

# Marketing

The Marketing office like it has for much of the summer is working on maintaining and updating our brand image. This has involved in-person marketing at events around campus, printing and ordering materials for larger giveaways, alongside social media advertising to help students better understand the work that happens at the AMS. Communications

The Communications office has been working on maintaining media relations, which has been a summer-long objective. This includes consistently updating students through the AMS newsletter, collaborating with AMS staff in reviewing content, and managing/responding to media requests. Future large initiatives also include working on the AMS annual report.

Dear Assembly,

It's good to see you again. Let us dive right into my report:

Consent Awareness Month | As you may know, the third week of September is Consent Awareness Week. This is a very big issue and one that requires all hands-on deck to influence our peer group narrative around what safe and consensual behaviour looks and sounds like, the conversations and behaviours around safe intervention, and the policies, attitudes, and systems that institutions (like Queen's) have in place to protect and guide our students. The resource sheet (thanks to Kate Hamill, Walkhome Head Manager, for sending this along) I hope can provide you and your staff with some onhand resources if students/staff/patrons/friends come to you looking for support or resources. As well, I understand from ETC's conversations with the University (DSA office in particular) that Queen's is reviewing the Sexual Violence policy because it is up for its triannual review next year. They are looking to have recommendations made for the complaint process (from conversations with Barb Lotan, I understand that this process is not very survivor centric and has room for improvements; is not utilized very much). Bus-it | The program has successfully launched! Full time students do not have to take any action to opt-in to the program. The program is included in the slate of mandatory student activity fees that is paid through your SOLUS Student Centre. The fee was made mandatory approved by the student body by referendum. Make sure to show your driver the back of your student card with your validated year sticker received by the Registrar's office to ride with the program! For the month of September the drivers are accepting up to 2019-2020 validation stickers. All full-time Queen's student transit fares are covered by the 'Bus-It' program starting September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022. Part time students can choose to opt in to the program, however, you will be assessed for ALL ancillary fees, not just the Bus-it fee of \$122. Services Pamphlet | Thank you to Julia Sin, Cassie Luk, and Niki Boytchuk-Hale for putting this together. The pamphlet illustrates the 13 services that AMS provides and you should see them in print at our services soon!

**Services Updates** All services are open for in-person operations. Most services have opened Fall Hiring! All services, excluding the FBK, PSC, and WHS, will be closed for National Truth and Reconciliation Day this September 30<sup>th</sup>.

**CGR**: In person operations at the Queen's Centre. All operations are running smoothly with school year hours in place.

**PSC**: In person operations at Mitchell Hall through a partnership with DSA's Student Wellness Services. Zoom-in operations are still available. The service is to move fully in person to the Rideau building later this month.

**QSC**: The full Queen's Student Constable management team has been hired. This team includes a new assistant manager position of Public Liaison and Recruitment Assistant Manager. Together, this team brings forward a new energy for constables, to revitalize and revisit how constables exist within the Queen's student life. On September 30th, QSC will only be servicing events related to NTRD.

**STQ**: In person operations in the Rideau Building. The Tricolour Agenda is to be printed at PCC later this month for distribution to the student body.

**PCC**: In person operations at the Queen's Centre. All operations are running smoothly with school year hours in place. A new initiative, the Poster Sale launches in the third week of September in the QC in collaboration with STQ.

**FBK**: In person operations at the LaSalle Building. All operations are running smoothly with school hours in place. The FBK is to close September 22 and 23 during their move to the Rideau Building. The PEACH Market is moving into its second week of operations. FBK Management continues to work closely with DSA Hospitality to ensure that PEACH is meeting the needs of students who are seeking food security on campus.

**WHS**: In person operations at the Queen's Centre. All operations are running smoothly with school year hours in place. Westhome is to be launched after the Fall Reading Break.

**TRO**: In person operations at the Queen's Centre. All operations are running smoothly with school year hours in place. TRO will close for move into Rideau on September 26 to reopen after the Fall Reading Break.

JNL: All operations are running smoothly with school year release schedule in place.

#### Hello Everyone,

This month has been incredibly dense with work for the Internal Affairs office, and I will try to lay out the key highlights below.

#### Assembly

We will have our first Assembly of the year on September 22<sup>nd</sup>, which is a very exciting process for us and, hopefully, everyone else. We hope to book spaces for all Assemblies very soon and will be working to solidify the schedule for the year. Scrolling down here, you have probably had the chance to look at the Agenda and can tell that this will be a very lengthy meeting. Arranging all the files and motions has been a major task for this month, as it is every September. Other months should generally be much better, and the time allocated to that work can go elsewhere. We have also been doing some hiring work.

#### Policy

Our first Policy change will be coming up this Assembly with Assembly Policy receiving an update. It had a major overhaul last year, and we are fixing some of the problems that we have seen since its current inception. Other Policy work is happening, and I have my fingers crossed for a potential change in workflow, which would increase efficiency, but that is still up in the air.

#### Elections

September is a hectic month for Elections, with many Faculty Societies electing representatives and other members, so that has been a significant focus for the Chief Electoral Officer. Furthermore, the process of Student Activity Fees and the Triennial Review started in September, so we will be ready to take in the host of applications that come in later in the process. We have also been doing some hiring work.

#### Judicial

I hope everyone's school year has been off to a great start so far! The Commission of Environmental Sustainability (CES) has many exciting updates to share.

Sustainability Month is right around the corner! Taking place October 3<sup>rd</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup>, we have three weeks of sustainable events and initiatives to engage the Queen's, Kingston and St-Lawrence communities. This year the themes for the month are Land/Agriculture, Sustainable Homes and Cities and Fashion. The calendar of events will be released soon!

This year, I wanted to bring the Environmental Coalition together through a joint goal. The Coalition consistent of clubs, faculty society members and individuals who have an interest in sustainability and climate change. Through this, all those who wanted to participate could while maintaining their own autonomy in their clubs and events. We had our first Coalition meeting mid-August, with another one planned for September. Although the project has not been solidified, we have as a collective decided to work with the city on a joint climate action to reduce emissions in the Queen's student district. I am excited to continue to bring updates on this initiative as it progresses!

The Sustainable Action Fund (SAF) just opened its first application period of the year! This fund allows undergraduate students to gain funding for sustainable events and initiative on campus. There will be two more periods of application during this academic year, one in November and another in the end of January. Updates and the application for this can be found on the CES Instagram in the linktree bio or under the sustainability tab on the AMS website.

The Collective Closet, a clothing swap-based initiative with QBACC has seen much success in its first two pop-up shops of the year. This initiative engages many members of the Queen's community, and I am excited to see it grow this year. We hope to continue to do pop-up shops once and month, and eventually open a space in LaSalle with weekly hours.

The Deputy of Environmental Sustainability and the Collective Closet Deputy for the CES have both started their work. The Deputy of Environmental Sustainability oversees the Sustainable Event Certificate (SEC) and additional projects. The Collective Closet Deputy oversees the functions of the Collective Closet. We are also in the process of hiring a Marketing Deputy to help with our social media presence and increase engagement online. The Lettuce Love Garden continues to grow, although it has slowed down as the winter months begin to approach. The next steps for the garden are to prepare it for winter and plan how it will be planted again in the early spring. The CES continues to work on the Coca-cola advocacy project. We have a meeting coming up soon to discuss next steps. Lastly, the CES and AMS recently released a survey about sustainable menstruation products, for an initiative we are going to run October/November. It had a great response, and I am excited to continue to update you on this initiative as well.

Hello Assembly Members,

First, congratulations to all Faculty Society heads, Orientation Roundtable, and 500+ Orientation volunteers for putting on a fantastic couple of weekends. Walking around on campus I could see that all the hard work put in over the last year has paid off!

We have finally approved and provided recommendations all goal plans, marketing plans, and budgets for the year. You will be seeing the government-side budgets and GP's up for Assembly approval this month, as you are the stakeholders that decides whether to approve the allocated funds of student dollars. As a reminder, the AMS is funded in three ways: student fees, customer revenue, and investments.

The board has completed the four summer meetings of the year. In addition to approving the budgets and plans, we went through the approval process of various new employee-facing policies to comply with Ontario legislature, approved the creation of several new positions, new logo approval, the Social Issues Commission restructuring, as well as the approval of the full AMS consolidated budget.

Great work by our committee heads as well, who provided their year-long goal plans in July and August. Their goals are in line with the high-level themes of the board this year, including a return to an effective and efficient AMS after the pandemic.

As well, the audit is underway through KPMG to provide a third party look at the AMS. The results of that audit will be available to our stakeholders, and we will have our representative present to answer questions in our November 2022 Corporate Special General Meeting. The strategic committee is looking to meet in the next couple weeks, where we will take on the project of creating a 5-year short term plan for the AMS coming out of our pandemic operations. This is essential to the health and vitality of the society, as the next few years are looking bright with the move to the new JDUC, merging of PCC/STQ, creation of new student jobs, and a positive relationship with the university.

#### Training

Wrapping up August training has been successful. The executive team worked hard all summer to create the content of the ResSoc specific training. Feedback should be collected on staff's perspective on training and this will be deliberated within the executive team. The team has created an RF specific folder and has consolidated all ResSoc training powerpoints into one folder. This is an improved from prior years to ensure that if people required revision of training material, this would be found in one folder. All staff would have access to this folder when using their ResSoc specific e-mail. Onboarding bags have been distributed to staff. Onboarding resources for event planning has been distributed by the Programs & Marketing Officer. I am pleased that ResSoc had a few team bonding socials throughout the training session and I hope this supportive community can grow in the upcoming months.

#### Move-in

The logistics of move-in were relatively clear and insightful. Having three points of contact during the day was extremely helpful to monitor the flow t-shirt and ticket selling as well as money being collected. We believe that this initiative will be a step forward in promoting Indigenization within Residence and on campus and a form of active critical allyship to the Indigenous community at Queen's.

As part of the implementation process, we would like to hear the opinions of students and student-staff regarding this potential initiative. This will help ResSoc and H&A make informed decisions about the exact nature of this event, should we move forward with this idea.

2 gender neutral washrooms on the ground floor

The BBQ was followed by a series of boothing events we have run throughout the week inviting students to apply and be part of ASUS as well as inviting students in for our open house – Our goal this year is to make the ASUS Offices a welcoming and inviting space once again where students can stop by for supports, resources, and to find community!

#### Orientation

This comes with the launch of the SVPR Coalition which will be chaired by our SVPR Director Kerry Roe. The goal of this coalition is to meet a couple of times a semester and group all students who participate in SVPR related advocacy with the objective of centering/streamlining all SVPR advocacy and initiatives on Queen's campus and ultimately empowering student voices. Representatives of the SVPR Coalition will also be reflected and present at the Queen's University SVPR Task Force. We have already met with several Faculty Society executives and look forward to meeting individually with some other student leaders as well before commencing our inaugural coalition meeting in October!

#### **Professional Development**

The Professional Development team is busy working with the Advancement office on planning Life After ArtSci, planned to take place this November in Toronto! With the theme of "Momentum of ArtSci", we will be taking on a cohort of students to a variety of Toronto based firms and networking with Queen's alumni. Additionally, the team is also putting together the Alumni Mentorship Initiative and are also exploring potential industries for collaborations. This comes in the form of a reading and reflection gathering in the Reflection Room amongst other initiatives which we look forward to sharing more information on through social media in the coming weeks.

There were several housekeeping changes concerning dates being updated and formatting being changed to be more consistent with other Policies, but those changes are relatively inconsequential.

#### A.1.1.a.ix

The Commissioner of Clubs was added under this section as they had not been listed among the members of the Alma Mater Society at Assembly. This is correcting a previous oversight.

#### A.1.1.b.v

The DAN School Undergraduate Society was removed from this list they are not currently classified as a Faculty Society. All Faculty Societies listed below them were shifted one space up as a result.

## A.1.2.b-h

This area was relatively vague, so changes were made to clarify certain statements.

- Original: AMS Assembly strives to have 1 Assembly member per 500.
- New: AMS Assembly strives to have 1 Assembly member per 500 students under the AMS.

Section c was removed as it provided powers that were not present in the same manner in the Constitution. All other sections would have to shift up by one as a result.

• Removed: If a Faculty Society moves in a different percentage designation, they are permitted to add an additional representative with 2/3 majority vote by Assembly.

The seat allocations for Assembly were changed to match the requirement set out under A.1.2.b: AMS Assembly strives to have 1 Assembly member per 500 students. Note: This change is set to apply to the following school year (I.e., 2023-2024) as making this changes this late would be a major inconvenience for many Faculty Societies. • New:

- Old: Faculty Societies may have up to this amount of representatives but may not exceed without Assembly permission.
- New: Faculty Societies may have up to this number of representatives but may not exceed.

Section g was explained a bit further so gathering representative information will be simpler in the future.

• New: Societies must attempt to gather representatives before the Fall term begins and update the Secretary with a list of representatives before the start of the Fall term. In the event a representative cannot be elected by this time, the Secretary must be notified of when the election will be held.
